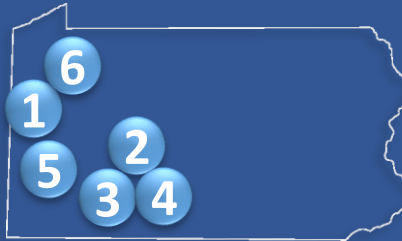
Screening, Brief Intervention and Referral to Treatment (SBIRT) is a comprehensive, integrated, public health approach for early identification and intervention with patients whose patterns of alcohol and/or drug use put their health at risk.¹

WHY

PA has the 3rd highest drug overdose mortality rate in the U.S. (44.3 per 100,000).²

Only 6% of adults seeking SUD treatment in PA had access within two weeks.³

Ensure that every patient in our primary care clinics receives the right screening, brief intervention, and referral to treatment (SBIRT) services by the right providers every time.
